Minister's Musings

Think about such things

At the end of his letter to the Philippians, Paul gives a prescription for positive thinking that if followed has the power to transform our lives. Finally, brothers, whatever is true, whatever is noble, whatever is right, whatever is pure, whatever is lovely, whatever is admirable—if anything is excellent or praiseworthy—think about such things.

This verse gives us eight questions to ask about our thoughts. Before you think and before you speak, ask these six questions.

1. Is it true? "Whatever is true." Truth is the first test. Knox translates this as "all that rings true." Before you open your mouth, are you speaking the truth? Do your words have the "ring of truth" about them? This question rules out all that is dishonest, untrue, and unreliable. Don't entertain lies, or gossip, or rumors, or half-truths, in your thinking about other people or situations you are facing. Concentrate on what you know to be true.

2. Is it noble? "Whatever is noble." The word means "honor-able, worthy of reverence." Some commentators have suggested that the word 'noble' here also carries the idea of being serious, rather

than flippant or superficial. Is your thought life honorable? Do you ponder things that are noble and of serious purpose? Or do you dwell on the frivolous and trivial?

3. Is it right? "Whatever is right." This means "in conformity to God's standards." Not, "Is it right in my eyes?" or "Is it right in the eyes of others?" but "Is it right in God's eyes?" Find out what pleases the Lord, Paul urges us in Eph 5.10.

4. Is it pure? "Whatever is pure." The word means "undefiled, chaste, clean, holy." It touches the whole area of moral purity. Is your thought-life clean? We used to say, "Get your mind out of the gutter." If you live in the gutter, don't be surprised that your mind is covered with slime.

Paul says, "Think about things that are not tainted with evil." Every day on our computer and television screens we are bombarded with images that are anything but right and pure. The phrase "garbage in, garbage out" applies here.

5. Is it lovely? "Whatever is lovely", attractive, pleasing to our sense of beauty, Paul continues, as opposed to dwelling on things that are ugly. The word refers to that which is beautiful and attractive in a moral sense and aesthetically. Think about a sunset, amazing athleticism, and beautiful art and music. But also think about a newborn baby, caring for the poor, hugging a loved one, and someone pouring out their heart in prayer. It's why a walk in the country, to appreciate God's handiwork in creation, can be so therapeutic.

6. Is it admirable? "Whatever is admirable", comes next, to cover anything that people admire or have a good opinion about. This question asks us to focus on the things that are positive, not negative, constructive not destructive, things that build up not the things that tear down. This means editing your words so that you simply delete the non-admirable things from your vocabulary.

And since Paul has not given us an exhaustive list of good things, he extends the list by saying "if anything is excellent or praiseworthy—think about such things" (4:8b). Paul gives us the freedom to expand our thoughts to the many wonderful things the Lord has given us to think about.

The verse ends with a promise. "And the God of peace will be with you." The God of peace only dwells with us when we think and do what God is telling us to think and do in verses 8 and 9. The desire of a true Christian is the God of peace more than the peace of God. The result of a pure mind is that you will have the presence of God. The God of peace will be with you.

About 6 months ago, the father of a friend was diagnosed with Type II diabetes. The family immediately jumped in to help, learning how to cook new recipes, get in the exercise and his check up in January was off the charts! Sugars had dropped, other levels had stabilized, all great news. He then moved in with my friend so they could just take care of each other. One day he went into the kitchen for his coffee and she heard a thump. Within mere seconds he was gone. Massive heart attack. It took her three weeks to tell those not closest to her. I immediately inquired of her best friend what her favourite colour was and promptly sent off a shawl without telling her I was doing so. No card, just the shawl and tag. When she received it, I received a simple message "I cannot thank you enough". As we chatted online she shared what she was feeling when she put it around her shoulders. "You truly "feel" the strength of others when you wear the shawl! It is amazing!!! "I feel empowered and protected with it on." "I still cannot put into words what the shawl radiates. It is kind of spooky in a sense. It means the world to me "
