### MINISTER'S MUSINGS

Phillip Keller, the Canadian sheep rancher gives us a good clue about the meaning of this phrase when he reminds us about "the general restlessness of sheep. "They are," he writes, "skittish, resistant to lying down in a pasture unless they know they are safe." Then he compares. For many of us, like sheep, are skittish too. We're moving, he notices, always moving, from one task to the next. As our "to do" list grows, our stress level rises. And as it does, we find it tough to concentrate, hard to relax, and oddly enough sometimes it's difficult even to lie down and go to sleep. Now, the antidote for a frenetic, fast paced life is this: God make you to lie down in green pastures; Notice that the shepherd "makes" me lie down. Josephus, a first century scholar, has written that sometimes the shepherd would institute forced rest periods for his sheep, especially for the frolicking lambs. A little child does not like to lie down, to rest. Kids say, "I'm not tired yet." Resistance to rest is a mark of immaturity. Sheep don't like to rest, to lie down. "He makes me lie down." That's

a forcing. The shepherd would take the sheep and fold their legs in such a way that they would become paralyzed for a while and therefore had to lie down and get their much-needed rest.

Keller says that in order for sheep to lie down 4 things are required: 1. First of all, they have to be full. Hungry sheep stay on their feet searching for another mouthful of food. Our shepherd provides us with the spiritual food we need. If we hunger and thirst after righteousness, he has promised to fill us. That's why "he makes me to lie down in green pastures." 2. Secondly, they must be unafraid. They will not lie down if they're fearful. The least suspicion of wolves or bears & they stand ready to flee. But nothing guiets a flock of sheep like seeing their shepherd in the field with them. Like sheep, we also are easily frightened. We live in an uncertain life. Any hour can bring disaster. And generally, it is the unknown, the unexpected, that frightens us most. But nothing quiets our souls like knowing that our Shepherd is near. Suddenly things are not half as black nor nearly as terrifying. Our Lord is with us. "God has not given us a spirit of fear, but of power and of love and of a sound mind." (I Timothy 1:7). 3. Thirdly, they must be content. If flies or fleas are bothering them, they'll not lie down. They must be comfortable before they'll lie down. 4. Finally, sheep will not lie down unless there is harmony in the flock. In every animal society there is an established order of dominance or status. In chickens, it is known as the pecking order. Among sheep it is called the butting order. Sheep maintain their status by butting and driving away other sheep from their favorite grazing spot. When there is this tension in a flock, the sheep can't lie down and rest. But whenever the shepherd is around, they forget their rivalries and stop their fighting.

In a letter to his friends, hymn writer Wendell P. Loveless related this story: One evening a speaker who was visiting the United States wanted to make a telephone call. He entered a phone booth but found it to be different from those in his own country. It was beginning to get dark, so he had difficulty finding the number in the directory. He noticed that there was a light in the ceiling, but he didn't know how to turn it on. As he tried again to find the number in the fading twilight, a passerby noted his plight and said, "Sir, if you want to turn the light on, you have to shut the door." To the visitor's amazement and satisfaction, when he closed the door, the booth was filled with light. He soon located the number and completed the call.

In a similar way, when we draw aside in a quiet place to meditate on God's word and to pray, we must block out our busy world and open our hearts to the Father. Our darkened world of disappointments and trials will then be illuminated. We will enter into communion with God, we will sense His presence, and we will be assured of His provision for us. I pray that we may find some rest in the presence of our good shepherd and come back refreshed and satisfied. God bless you all!
