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MINISTER'S MUSINGS

March 6 is the first Sunday of Lent. Forty days crossed by six Sundays, beginning in Ashes and ending in resurrection joy. Why 40 days? Well, the number 40 is certainly in the Bible: Israel spent 40 years in the wilderness learning to trust God. Elijah spent 40 days in the wilderness before hearing the still, small, voice of God on the same mountain where Moses spent 40 days listening to God give the law. Then we have Luke's own story of Jesus' spending 40 days in the wilderness.


And what is that wilderness? The Greek word for wilderness used in this passage is eremos, and it literally means uninhabited, a place with no human population. The emphasis is not so much on the terrain of the landscape as it is on the solitary quality of the landscape.

And with Covid-19 many people probably feel they are in a similar place. A place where they are stuck. A place where they feel fruitless. A place where life is on hold. And it can feel like time is just being wasted. And the isolation is certainly wilderness-like.

Yet, what is important to understand when it comes to the wilderness time, is that this is not lost time. God uses wilderness time to refine His people. In fact, there are some lessons that are best learned in the wilderness. The wilderness is where David learned to become a leader of men. The wilderness is where Paul came to a fuller understanding of the gospel. The wilderness is where the children of Israel learned about the importance of faith. The wilderness is where Moses was humbled enough to become a servant. The wilderness was where Jesus faced and overcame temptation. Wilderness time is not lost time; it is time when God can do a deeper work in our lives if we are open to His guidance. What is God doing in such times? He is revealing our hearts. He is providing for us and reassuring us of his goodness. He is forming us as his children.

We observe Lent because Jesus entered the wilderness long before us and we're chasing after — hoping, expecting, to meet God there. To meet Jesus there. God with us. So, if you come to Lent this year already overwhelmed by the wilderness, without strength enough to give something up or take something up. Don't. Instead allow yourself to be taken up by your fellow wanderers in the wilderness. Let the faith and velocity of the church around you carry you. Find ways to be together as we slowly get back to the church. And if you find yourself already buoyed up, already carried, with energy to do — by all means

don't keep it to yourself. Reach out in faith, hope and love to others around you. Especially those who may be feeling without the capacity to reach out on their own. And let's journey through the wilderness together.

NOTES FROM THE LOFT

The style most often associated with early Christian music is that of the chant. While often denoted as a "Gregorian chant," Gregory was actually rather late on the scene, as these chants were already being used long before he lent his name to them. This involved a layered recitation based on a scale pattern and hexachords.



However, the psalms were likely more musical, as the writers were known to use instruments, and several of the psalms themselves specify the instrument for which they were written. This would indicate the use of melody, which surely carried through to the early worshippers.

It is important to note, that by the early years of the Common Era, before 300 AD, many musical instruments were considered to be linked to "sensual heathen cults" and therefore were forbidden in churches of the time.
